

Foreshore and Seabed - Our Response...

TE RARAWA RESPONSE TO THE GOVERNMENT'S DECISION TO LEGISLATE FORESHORE AND SEABED LANDS AS 'PUBLIC DOMAIN' AND APPROPRIATE TIKANGA MAORI TIPU WHENUA - TAKUTAI MOANA TAONGA TUKU-IHO...

Te Runanga o Te Rarawa held a meeting on December 17th 2003 where delegates from 23 of its 27 marae approved the following statements.

"Te Rarawa whanau, hapu & iwi will not relinquish their rights over their Takutai Moana;- the ancestral lands of the foreshore and seabed over which they hold manawhenua and manamoana.

It is the intention of Te Rarawa to erect a continual line of 'Pou-whenua' along its coast-line from Hokianga to Te Oneroa –a-Tohe (the Ninety Mile Beach) as a visual statement of its rights, and to promote this proposal to all the iwi of Te Hiku o Te Ika to extend the pou whenua on both coastlines.

If the government persists with its policy to confiscate by legislation the rights of Te Rarawa to all its foreshore and seabeds, **it is the intent of Te Rarawa** to withdraw from current negotiations with the Crown of its historical treaty claims.

Te Rarawa will begin negotiating with other Iwi the intent to conduct another land march similar to the land march led by Dame Whina Cooper in 1975 .

Te Rarawa will continue its policy of open access to their coastal beaches by people of the general public with the proviso that they respect the pou whenua and the tikanga of Te Rarawa.

Te Rarawa will continue to discuss its position with Maori representatives in government with the challenge that they take the lead from their two 'Wahine-toa' colleagues".

This statement was provided by Gloria Herbert, Chairperson Te Runanga o Te Rarawa.

Te Rarawa Chairperson for next 3 years decided...

Te Runanga o Te Rarawa Triennial Elections were held on October 29th, 2003 at the Kaitia Runanga Offices. Most of our marae delegates were present for this important occasion. The Elections were widely discussed and debated throughout Te Rarawa in the weeks leading up to this date.

Gloria Herbert retained her position as Chairperson of Te Runanga O Te Rarawa for a second term. 90% of the Runanga Marae delegates and many kaumatua from the hapu of Te Rarawa crowded into the large Runanga Bay Room to witness and participate in the event.

Voting papers had been distributed in the months prior to the election day, with Marae Committees and Trusts being asked to choose who they would like to lead the organisation for the next 3 years. Deciding who will lead and speak for the Runanga was a crucial decision for the marae and hapu to make, as it proceeds towards the possible settlement of its historical Treaty Claims, the completion of the Constitutional Review and any resultant organisational changes that may bring, Te Ohu Kaimoana decision making and the many other activities that a chairperson must attend to.

The preferential vote system was once again employed as it had proved to be a very clear way of reaching a decision. Brother Brian Stanaway of Panguru was the Returning Officer and explained the proceedings to the anticipatory room, and introduced the 2 scrutineers Louise Marshall and Carol Berghan. Questions about process and eligibility were asked and any concerns allayed. They

then took the voting papers box away to be counted and this process took almost 1 hour to complete. During this time many of our kaumatua took the opportunity to pass on panui and views on a wide range of current matters and to hear about some of the upcoming activities that Runanga Staff were engaged in.

When the trio returned to the room there was a hushed silence as Brother Brian wrote up the results on the white board. Out of the 58 possible votes 52 had been received and of those only 2 were invalid. This left 50 valid votes to be counted. A majority of 26 would be needed to secure victory.

The candidates Malcolm Peri, Puni Makene, Katie Murray and Gloria Herbert waited in keen anticipation as the results were written up on the Board. (continued on page 6)

A small Delegation from Te Runanga o Te Rarawa attended the ceremony, and the Award was presented to our Chairperson Gloria Herbert and RMU Manager Cat Davis. The Award acknowledges Te Rarawa's efforts in raising awareness about the Kukupa as a threatened species (with particular reference to the Kukupa Mural Project at the Panguru Runaruna Road/Pawarenga Junction). It also recognises the collaborative working relationships that Te Rarawa is building with DoC in order to address shared environmental concerns.

This Award truly belongs to all community members and Runanga staff past and present, as it is a culmination of all their collective passion and contributions: nga mihi rawa atu ki a koutou katoa!

Refuse and Recycling

This mahi is jointly shared by RMU and the Runanga Business Development Unit. 'Clean Stream Northland' (or 'CSN' - the name of Te Runanga o Te Rarawa and CBEC's joint venture) is now into its third month of operation. CSN was awarded the Far North District Council's 'Refuse and Recycling Services - Northern' contract in August. Since then, we've had numerous community meetings around the District, many of them attended by Council representatives and staff. It has been very valuable having all three stakeholders - Ratepayers, Council, and CSN as the Service Provider - in the meetings at the same time kanohi ki te kanohi, so each can hear everyone's concerns. As a result, clarity is increasing about who in fact is responsible for the many waste management issues communities have. Council has agreed to make some positive changes in light of needs the communities have voiced themselves. This is a great little victory, but as we all know there's always room for more improvement!

CSN's priority right now is to get the Refuse and Recycling Stations ready for the anticipated Christmas holiday period. But we will continue to advocate community concerns directly with Council. For example, we've requested meetings with Council Engineers and the Mayor to discuss Council's possible return to a 'Global' Waste Contract for the year beginning 2004 - CSN agrees with ratepayers that such a move will be to this District's detriment.

CSN is also grateful for the 'grassroots intelligence' and feedback about the Transfer Stations and the service we provide, as this keeps us in touch with you - the end user. In many respects, you are the eyes and ears in the community, so keep it coming!

Business Development Unit

2003 - What A Year!

A report by Vance Winiata—Manager Business Development Unit.

It is with pleasure I report on the activities within the Unit for the year ending 2003.

The Business Development Unit includes the Housing, Fisheries, Possum Control, Land Use and Business/Employment opportunities portfolio's.

Housing

The main focus of work for the Housing Team has been the Essential Repairs (improving the sub-standard homes within the rohe of Te Rarawa) and new developments for individually and communally owned housing projects.

The Essential Repair work currently has 481 whanau on our database with only 40 still waiting to be assessed. 31 repair jobs have been completed to date, 6 of these by Te Runanga O Te Rarawa Housing Team. We have another 27 which have been approved and either have work in progress or have been scheduled for work to be completed, 6 of these 27 will be undertaken by Housing New Zealand contractors and rest by Te Runanga O Te Rarawa Housing Team. The total work/approved to commence to date has been in excess of \$1.3m.

The new/community home developments take some time before commencement as a consequence of land and debt servicing issues being resolved first. Having said that we are pleased to advise we have a



7 units. Kuia/Kaumatuā development well progressed to almost building consent application stage situated in Kaitaia anticipated to commence construction in March 2004. In addition we are also working on a marae community development in Motuti which is pending the consent of the marae trustees for the project to proceed otherwise all other preliminary work has been completed to this point.

Fisheries

The Fishing Company (Te Rarawa Fisheries 2000 Ltd) is currently being reshaped. We are pleased to announce the appointment of 2 new fishermen who operate the St Antonio vessel – Heta Conrad and Cliff Parker. We look forward to a profitable season for the fishermen and Te Rarawa starting fresh in this regard.

The Annual Catch Entitlement (ACE) for Deepwater and Inshore has recently been allocated which will be put to the market in order to obtain the highest and best price for Te Runanga O Te Rarawa.

Possum Contract Work

Te Runanga O Te Rarawa were successful in 9 blocks to treat within the Warawara and Raetea ngahere which we have subcontracted to a hapu trust (Te Herenui O Te Uri O Tai) to undertake the Warawara work. The Raetea blocks (of

which there are 2) will also be sub-contracted out.

We see the sub-contracting to Te Herenui Trust as a significant step in the hapu development of both the Runanga and the hapu benefiting out of this arrangement. It is time for this activity to be progressed to the next level which is looking at the by-product trade (meat and fur).

Waste Management

In August 2003 the Runanga entered into a joint venture with CBEC and were successful in obtaining a contract for a one year period for the waste management of the Northern Zone which includes Hokianga, Kaitaia, Mangonui and Cape Reinga rohe. CBEC are responsible for the operational arm and the Runanga has a vested interest in the management of the resource and spin off employment opportunities that may come out of the contract. The future of this arrangement will be dependent upon the Far North District Councils decision whether or not to extend the contract or look at an alternative contractor to provide this service. Going on our current performance we see no reason why council would deviate from the current arrangement.

Treaty Claim process

The Business Development will also participate in the commercial redress assisting the Treaty Negotiations Team in their negotiations. This will involve scoping the properties which the Crown has land banked for settlement purposes which are within the rohe of Te Rarawa and categorising these properties with regard to their desirability with regard to their current use and potential highest and best use. This exercise is to be undertaken over the next 2 months and will involve inspection of all properties, the kerb side valuation and subsequent report to the Negotiations Team.

Te Rarawa Carpentry Training Course

In March 2003 Te Runanga O Te Rarawa in partnership with Unitec initiated a carpentry training course here in Kaitaia which after 36 weeks we still had 25 registered students on the course. If the course success is measured by improving student self esteem and upskilling whanau then it would be fair to say this course has been a huge success. We are also pleased to advise that 8 of the students will be incorporated within the wider housing initiative employed as apprentice carpenters through to March 2004 prior to the second year of the course commencing. It is likely a number of these students will stay on and it should coincide with our Kuia/Kaumatuā development where at least 4 of the students will be employed on that development.

At time of writing we also had one of the students likely to be employed by an outside carpenter which is encouraging to see graduates from this course are now in a stronger position to obtain employment in the wider market as opposed to what they were able to do prior to coming on to the course.

In summary I would like to thank all members of my team for their commitment throughout 2003, namely Turi Te Hira, Noline Tua, Margaret Wright, Doc Cassidy, Kevin Pilbrow, Malcolm Bellette, Heta Conrad, Clifford Parker, Bobby Proctor and his possum gang and Whaea Ellen Graham.

Community Centre with wananga on the claims, and other information about the mahi of the Runanga and wider issues. We will also be having rolling entertainment throughout the day with kapa haka performances and other Te Rarawa talent on show.

We are planning a Celebrity Debate, Rangatira Ball and Prizegiving for Saturday evening

Easter Sunday will be a day for marae, hapu & whanau to come together and hold their own events.

From Tuesday, 13th April, weekdays until 28th April an exhibition, daily wananga and retail outlet are planned. We are aiming to secure a Commerce St position for the duration of the festival with interactive activities for our tamariki to do over the holidays, as well as daily wananga and workshops for

older whanau members.

So, there you have it, an overview of our first Hui Ahurei. What is needed now are people who can commit to making all of this happen, we need organisers, arts and crafts people, sports administrators, marae and hapu key people and anyone else who thinks they have something to offer to come to a planning meeting in Kaitaia Friday 23rd January at 10am; Te Runanga o Te Rarawa, 28 South Road.

Remember this festival is our first one ever - making it happen together will ensure its success!

Te Kura Kaupapa Maori o Te Rangianiwaniwa Excellence

Te Rangi Aniwaniwa students excelled in sports, academic subjects and performing arts during 2003. Six third formers and 100% of the fourth formers have passed NCEA Level 1 this year. Fourteen students completed their national certificate of computing and 8 students completed their Waikato University Level 1 papers, (Ngahua Harawira with an A average). The newly formed sports academy fielded 10 students who represented Te Rangi Aniwaniwa in 2 national sporting codes: Wiremu Ratana, Bobby Jay Morunga, Anaru Ratana, Rex Mare, Rawiri Robinson, Rangi Moses, Ngahua Harawira, Harata Brown, Leonie Murray and Waimarie Halkyard. Four girls represented Aotearoa internationally in basketball (Merenia Halkyard 10 years, Waimarie Halkyard, Harata Brown and Rangi Moses). 95% of the seniors in wharekura passed level 4 performing arts and the junior kapa haka team were selected to represent Tai Tokerau in the national primary kapa haka.

Outgoing principal Hilda Halkyard-Harawira is pleased by the results. "Great staff, a strong whanau and board have made good things happen for our Muriwhenua children. We have a computer network for the senior kura and a "hakari model" which allows our students to bank their credits for studies from Form 3. The highlight of the year has been the opening of Te Puna Wai which has proved to be a valuable community resource. Within six weeks our children have learnt to swim thanks to swim safe coordinator Esther Hone. The powhiri for new students, staff and the new Ngati Kahu principal will be held on the first day of school Jan 27 at 10 am. Whaea Hilda has been appointed Tumuaki of Te Wananga o Te Rangi Aniwaniwa. Next year she will lead the Raukawa Bachelor of Maturanga Maori course which is aimed at senior wharekura and adult students in the area. Special thanks to all who have supported Te Rangi Aniwaniwa over the last 10 years.
