Mihi...

In the early hours of Sunday morning March 28th, the tekoteko carved by Te Hekenukumai (Hector) Busby was forcefully removed from the pouwhenua at Paripari on the Ahipara foreshore. The tekoteko was of Poroa, a rangatira chief of Te Rarawa who was renowned as a peacemaker. The loss of the tekoteko became as much a matter of interest to all the media (TV, papers and radio) as the blessing was on February 7th 2004.

The nationwide publicity however led to its recovery within two days when someone came across it in the Southern end of the Aupouri Forest, realised instantly what it was and called the police. The finder gave such clear directions of its location, our local Maori liaison police officer Paddy Whiu and our Executive Officer Kevin Robinson had no trouble finding it. It appeared to have been dragged by a vehicle up the Ninety Mile Beach, then into the forest from the Waipapakauri end and abandoned there.

Hector Busby's assessment was that although it was badly damaged it was not beyond repair. The good news

is that Hector has finished the major repair work, and all that remains to be done is the repainting of the facial moko. A date for the rededication will be set when the painting is finished and the task of fixing it back onto the pouwhenua is completed.

If any good could be seen to come out of this incident it would be the shock and dismay of the wider community that we live in. It is an indication of the growing understanding of the kaupapa for the pouwhenua as a symbol of the kaitiakitanga of Te Rarawa;- our practice of ownership based on tikanga Maori. In protecting the interests of Maori we are protecting the interests of all people and their right of ongoing access to the beach.

WE'RE MARCHING

"It's on," said Hone Harawira, organiser of the Far North leg of the March to Parliament to present a petition opposing the government's foreshore and seabed legislation. "It's not like we want to be marching. We've got heaps to do at home, but at the end of the day you just can't sit back and watch the government steal your lands, take away your rights, without doing something. You've got to act. You have an obligation to future generations to do something," said Mr Harawira.

Mr Harawira said that Maori had opposed the Crown's proposals at the consultation hui, written the submissions, been to Court, and even gone back to the Tribunal. "And yet," he said, "at the end of the day, the government is persisting with its threat to go ahead with the legislation." "When the government's own Treaty Unit, the Waitangi Tribunal, says 'government's foreshore and seabed policy breaches the Treaty in fundamental and serious ways. We are not prepared to suggest changes to the details of the policy ... changes to details would not redeem it', then you know there's something seriously flawed with it," said Mr Harawira.

Many Maori were not really clear on what the detail was all about, said Mr Harawira, but most knew that something was wrong. He said he had received emails from Maori living overseas saying they were sorry they couldn't be there to march, daily phone calls from people asking when something was going to happen, and even approaches from kuia wanting to know when the march was coming through their town.

Mr Harawira said that the government was wrong to interfere with the Court of Appeal ruling, and wrong to try to stop the Maori Land Court from hearing Maori claims.

"It's not like the Courts are on our side," said Mr Harawira, "but at least you understand the process. When government comes bullying its way in from left field, threatening to change the rules to keep you out of the game even before the game starts, then you know you're up against it."

Mr Harawira said that the Crown proposals were in breach of the Treaty of Waitangi, and contrary to Tikanga Maori, Common Law, and even International Law. He noted that legislation aimed to deny Maori the right to have their claims heard in Court, reduce Maori rights to simple commercial interests, and limit Maori rights to simple

"Government is introducing new rules to make it harder for Maori to claim their customary rights, and thanks to NZ

First, they are also making it impossible for Maori to afford to pay for legal action against the Crown," said Mr Harawira. "The funny thing is you can get legal aid if you murder someone, but not if you want to claim rights you have held for hundreds of years."

"So yes - we're marching. To do less would be to surrender. It's all we have left. We have so little, that what is left is very precious, and something we have to stand up for."

"We've just had a con-call with organisers from all around the country, and the word is go. We will be joining up with Ngati Kahungunu, who have already planned to march on Parliament, and we hope to march the last leg together, where we can present our petition to those who will listen."

The hui is primarily aimed at those who are delivering or coordinating te reo me ona tikanga activities, programmes, wananga etc. i.e. kaiako, tutors, teachers, marae, Reo Coordinators, kohanga reo kaimahi, University and Polytech programme deliverers and coordinators, kapa haka kaiako. Customary Fisheries Hui - nets some good resolutions

Over 40 interested people attended an inter-Iwi meeting regarding Customary Fisheries hosted by Te Runanga o Te Rarawa in late March. General discussion from the floor centred on the need for consistency in issuing permits and Cross-Iwi Coordination. These are the resolutions from that meeting.

Summary of Discussions and Recommendations:

1. That Iwi determine the maximum quantity to be gathered under a permit, for each species of kaimoana.
2. That Iwi define the term "hui" and whether permits should be issued for these types of hui.
3. That each marae should take measures to monitor the quantity of kaimoana being issued through permits on a monthly basis.
4. That Iwi determine their own process on who should be appointed as permit issuers within their rohe.
5. That respective Iwi discuss a proposal for a collective management of Toheroa beds.

RESOLUTIONS - all were carried

1: Register with MFish, but Iwi shall determine the process on those persons who shall issue permits on behalf of Iwi. Koha Reuben, Tauteihiihi/Sid Nathan, Korou Kore marae

2: Each hapu/marae issue permits only within their own area. Cat Davis, Roma marae/Riria Tauroa, Ahipara.

3: That there be a "register" of names of all those persons who issue permits Rongo Bentson, Morehu marae/Patariki Briggs, Tauteihiihi marae.

4: Iwi/Northland Regional Council hui called on by our own terms to present united proposals regarding Aquaculture Marine Area management. Matiu Wiki, Korou Kore marae/Manu Adams, Pikiparia marae.

Have you received your Tuhono panui?

Te Runanga o Te Karawa are encouraging ALL whanau (including those already on the register) to reply positively to the Tuhono registration details. "It will help us to keep in touch with our people no matter where they are," said Te Karawa Negotiator Paul White. He estimated that around 10% of people move each year, and not all let us know what their forwarding address is. "If mail is returned to us, then we put that person's registration on hold until they make contact," said former Registrations Manager Jaqi Brown, "with Tuhono we can now easily update whanau addresses," she continued.

"The big Iwi issues currently are the the Treaty Claims and Foreshore & Seabed, and it is important that ALL of our whanau have the opportunity to have a say in the future of Te Karawa, the only way to do this effectively is through communication. Tuhono will allow us to get the word out about these and other Iwi korero," said Jaqi Brown.
